Description of Entity's Outcomes

The purpose or mission of AfroConnect NZ is to build strong and vibrant African communities in New Zealand. They aim to achieve this by creating a central hub that connects individuals and groups with the resources they need to thrive. Their mission encompasses providing information, tools, and services that promote empowerment and inclusion for all African communities, with a particular focus on education, health, housing, and employment. Their ultimate vision is to foster a brighter future for African communities in New Zealand by empowering them and facilitating their connection to necessary resources, thereby contributing to the development and growth of New Zealand as a whole.

AfroConnect NZ has identified 4 priority areas:

- 1. Improved Health and Well-being: AfroConnect NZ seeks to improve the physical and mental health of African communities in New Zealand by providing access to healthcare information, mental health support, and resources. The outcome is to enhance the overall well-being and resilience of community members.
- **2. The outcome is increased housing stability, reduced housing-related stress, and improved living conditions.
- **3. Educational Attainment and Empowerment:** AfroConnect NZ strives to promote academic success and empower individuals with access to educational resources and tools. The outcome is increased educational attainment, improved academic performance, and greater opportunities for personal and professional growth among community members.
- **4. Economic Empowerment and Stability:** By supporting meaningful employment opportunities and providing tools and resources for economic empowerment, AfroConnect NZ aims to enhance the financial stability and resilience of African communities. The outcome is increased employment rates and greater economic contribution to New Zealand's economy by community members.

These outcomes align closely with AfroConnect NZ's mission of building strong and vibrant African communities in New Zealand, fostering a supportive environment where individuals can thrive and contribute positively to society.

African Community Unity Forum - 24 May 2024

Location: Te Manawa, Auckland

Attendance: Representatives from African community groups across New Zealand

Hosted by: ACOFI | Supported by AfroConnect NZ and others

Overview

On 24 May 2024, African communities from across Aotearoa came together in a powerful show of unity and shared purpose at the African Community Unity Forum. Held at the vibrant Te Manawa, this landmark event brought together diverse cultures, organisations, and leaders to reflect, connect, and shape a stronger collective future.

Event Purpose

- Strengthen collaboration across African-led organisations and regions
- Discuss key challenges and share success stories within the community
- Empower attendees with insights on health, leadership, and legal literacy
- Formally elect a National Council to advocate for African communities in New Zealand

Highlights

The forum created space for meaningful dialogue, inspiration, and strategic action. Highlights included powerful keynote speeches from African leaders on unity and resilience, engaging panel discussions on health, education, legal awareness, and leadership, and the landmark election of six leaders from four regions to form New Zealand's first National African Council—marking a significant step forward in community advocacy.

Nurturing Mental Wellness Workshop - 14 June 2024

Location: Te Kete Tuatea Meeting Room, Rototuna Library, Hamilton

Attendance: Approximately 25 participants

Hosted by: AfroConnect NZ

Overview

AfroConnect NZ's Nurturing Mental Wellness workshop, held on 14 June 2024 in Hamilton, offered a safe and inclusive space to explore emotional wellbeing, stress management, and culturally relevant approaches to mental health. The evening brought together expert speakers and community members for meaningful conversations and shared learning.

Event Purpose

- Promote understanding of mental health within African and wider communities
- Share evidence-based strategies for emotional regulation and stress management
- Provide a culturally safe space for honest, stigma-free conversations
- Facilitate meaningful connections between attendees and mental health professionals

Highlights

The workshop featured a dynamic lineup of speakers who brought both professional expertise and personal insight to the conversation. Each session offered practical tools and reflections tailored to the lived experiences of the African community in Aotearoa.

- Rumbidzai Chidzonga Offered insights on culturally responsive care
- **Britain Swarbrick** Delivered creative reflections on identity and emotional expression
- A mix of educational talks, interactive Q&A, and open discussion encouraged attendees to engage and reflect in a supportive setting
- Light refreshments, tea, and coffee helped create a warm and welcoming environment for conversation
